matter.” In the opinion of SSWA this is totally unacceptable and should require a plan of action, including a fixed date, to have this issue completely resolved!

New Business:

*A/ Trappers Rendezvous is scheduled for August 15th to the 17th at the Hibernia camp grounds. SSWA will again organize the BB/Pellet gun shoot. Eugene has new targets he bought in the States for this year’s event. He & Ron T. offered to man the booth again and supply the guns and ammo.

*B/ Stephen reviewed a letter he prepared on behalf of SSWA as a response to the invitation from DFO’s Species at Risk Management Division to offer our comments on their proposal to list Atlantic Salmon on the endangered species list for two areas of Nova Scotia – Eastern Cape Breton and Southern Upland. This in effect covers most of the province including South Shore and Valley, Eastern Shore and most of Cape Breton. A thank you has been received ensuring that our response will be included in the information package being prepared for the Minister of DFO.

Did You Know:

- The N.S. Federation of Agriculture has asked the province to do a study to see what can be done to reduce the number of deer destroying their crops in various regions including Sheffield Mills, Canning and the Truro areas. Crops such as soybeans, blueberries and young fruit trees are among the hardest hit. Tony Rodgers suggested the Fed. of Agri. contact local wildlife groups and arrange for hunters to come hunt on their lands to help reduce the herd size. Bag limits would follow the DNR allotment for the 2014 hunting season. Not only deer but also bear, birds and other animals are to blame for the damage.
- A full moon near the end of June means high tides which should bring the first run of salmon to the rivers. Tides are important to anglers because they are closely related to the movement of fish. High tides will bring fish into areas which may be too shallow other times. Since spring tides are much higher than normal most runs of sea run fish such as trout, Atlantic salmon, shad, stripped bass and gaspereau will re-enter fresh water on a spring tide. Low tides can also be effective times to fish because any fish present will be concentrated in a much smaller area. A falling tide will also concentrate marine worms and bait fish in channels where they attract fish such as sea run brook and brown trout or stripped bass.

“Risks of ocean based salmon farming”

- This article was brought to our meeting by Gary Mader. Read it carefully.

(The following article is from the long-time salmon advocate Bill Bryden of Corner Brook NFLD, on the provinces aquaculture industry and its effects on wild salmon stocks. Industry officials will be invited to respond in the next issue of the Sportsman magazine.)

With ocean-based salmon farming slated to double production and expand into every nook and cranny of Newfoundland's south coast, the likely results are alarming.

First off, though I want to make it perfectly clear that we are fully aware of the employment created by the aquaculture industry and nobody wants the fine folks of the provinces south coast – or anywhere else, for that matter to lose their jobs. We simply want any and all salmon farming operations to be land based.

Recently, while suggesting ocean based aquaculture was a serious threat to wild salmon stocks along our south coast for a long list of reasons, the Federal Environment Dept. suggested one option was to reduce mortalities by simply listing the salmon of our south coast as endangered and thus ban all angling. This of course would be done while ignoring the aquaculture effects and allowing them to expand with millions of taxpayers support dollars. This suggested ban would take in the entire south coast.

One might suggest that we are not only ignoring the things that accountants don't count, such as threats to wild salmon, but rewarding practitioners of this method of salmonid production for high risk, inefficient, unsustainable practices.

What industry is regularly paid millions from critical tax coffers for not producing fish while manufacturing and amplifying newly mutated strains of fish-killing diseases? In 2013 gov. paid over \$33 million in Newfoundland alone, \$13 m in N. S. and millions on N.B. In 2013 open-pen salmon farming disease compensation gobbled up over 96% of the moneys allotted by the gov. of Canada for disease compensation.

With gov. telling us 15 million trout and salmon went into a tiny coastal area of Newfoundland in 2013 and a measly \$183 m worth making it to market, we can quickly surmise what happened to the rest. Likely numbering near 7 million fish died. That is 6 times more than all the wild salmon in North America – all dead. In Newfoundland, a bastion of salmon refuge, we are down to less than one salmon per person in the province.

Most of the caged fish died from unknown causes triggered by diseases and sea lice. Some of the caged fish were eaten by predators biting their way into, jumping into, or flying into the cages. If the 15 million salmonid were not enough to attract the salmonid predators, then simply add the tens of thousands of tonnes of oily and rotting pellets thrown into the water. One can just imagine what baiting at this biblical level causes in the migrating tuna, shark, eagle, seal, toothed whale etc. populations.

One diver had to kill 19 sharks in a net cage in one day. While six-inch mesh predator netting offers some protection to the fish farm salmonids (while killing wildlife), no protection is granted for the wild fish on the other side of the netting, swimming with the attracted predators.

Similarly no lice treatments or antibiotics are given to the wild fish to combat the parasites and disease. Nor have our managers – unlike those in Norway or the UK - ever set legal limits on lice production.

Rumors abound of unreported losses of entire cages. At least one case comes with video evidence. In addition to this there are the 18,000 that escaped in 2013 during an outbreak of deadly ISA that the “Code of Containment” never recaptured.

At these sorts of fish densities the hundreds of salmon feedlot cages act as unprecedented, industrial scale nurseries for sea lice, bacteria, protozoans and viruses on an eco-cidal scale. Mutation and amplification gallop at an apocalyptic pace and scale. One simply could not design a better disease mutation and amplification chamber with NASA's help. *Continued next month!*
